

Urban Wildlife Program

Designed primarily as "people habitats," urban landscapes provide unique challenges and opportunities for wildlife conservation. As such, the Urban Wildlife Program specializes in supporting sustainable, wildlife-friendly practices in Indiana's most populated areas.

DNR urban wildlife biologists work with private businesses, local government, and individual citizens to develop attractive landscapes that provide habitat for beneficial wildlife, reduce conflicts with "nuisance" wildlife, improve water quality, and increase outdoor recreation opportunities for urban citizens.





Our Current Focus:

- 1. Keeping wildlife wild reducing the habituation of wildlife through public education
- 2. Lose the lawn and go native! Encouraging replacement of high-maintenance turf grass and invasive species with low-maintenance, native landscaping.
- 3. Monarch and pollinator conservation
- 4. Reducing wildlife conflicts through effective landscape modification

- Cost-share opportunities for habitat establishment
- Technical assistance for wildlifefriendly planning and development
- Educational presentations/workshops
- Guidance to prevent/reduce conflicts with wildlife (does not include nuisance animal removal)
